Enterprise Transformation is rapidly replacing approaches focused on incremental change with more aggressive and company-wide initiatives designed to impact the strategies, structures and human systems of the corporation.

Attendees will interact with senior executives and with leaders from the nation's leading Enterprise Transformation center – Enterprise 2020. They will be

joined by members of the Sinclair Group and other renowned leaders. Both strategy and execution will be addressed by three executive panels and three key issues sessions in this uniquely powerful and potentially very rewarding two-day program.

8:30 to 12:00 – Leveraging People Resources for Improved Performance – Valuable people-related strategies to energize your work force and improve organizational performance. (Charles Parsons, Professor of Organizational Behavior, Georgia Tech)

1:00 to 4:30 (and evening) – Capital Effectiveness – How to ensure effective spending through evaluation of paper industry technologies, markets and economic models; adoption of best practices. (Robert Kinstrey, Director, Process Technology, Jacobs Engineering.)

Wednesday, June 4

8:30 to 12:00 – Customer Relations – A framework and set of tools for profitable management of customer relationships. (Nicholas Lurie, Assistant Professor of Management, Georgia Tech)

1:00 to 4:30 – Effectively Managing Change – How to address the broad organizational context in which changes are embedded in concert with the specifics of the changes themselves. (Luis Martins)

Thursday, June 5

Metso Fellowship Program Now a Reality

In the November newsletter we described a joint Metso-CPBIS initiative, then in the planning stages, to establish a program that will bring technically-trained undergraduates to Georgia Tech to pursue a master's degree, with a focus on business issues that are relevant to the pulp and paper industry. That program is now in place. Metso Paper North America will be offering a fellowship to a qualified recipient to pursue a Master's Degree in a business-related discipline at Georgia Tech. Metso recognizes that today's competitive environment requires new employees to have strong business acumen paired with excellent technical skills. Metso has joined

with CPBIS to offer undergraduate engineering students a unique opportunity to pursue post-graduate education in business-related disciplines. Metso will provide financial support for one or more students to pursue a Master's Degree at Georgia Tech in one of several available academic programs. Supported students will be asked to select a thesis in an area approved by Metso. Often, these programs will also include part-time or seasonal internships.

Interested applicants must apply to a Georgia Tech Master's program in Economics, Business Administration, International Affairs, Public Policy, or History & Sociology of Technology & Science and must also submit a prescribed-format letter of intent to CPBIS. All application materials for the Metso Fellowship must be submitted by March 31, 2008. Recipients will be notified by May 15, 2008.
